## **PRESIDENT'S CORNER**

As we approach our last General Meeting on May 10<sup>th</sup>, the Florida Legislature has approached the last day of the 2010 Legislative Session. The League can list its accomplishments, but at this point, I am not too sure about the legislature. After heated debate today, the Senate passed HJR 7231 which is their redistricting amendment. This will appear on the November ballot among other proposed amendments. Be prepared for a fight.

At our Annual Meeting, in addition to installing officers and directors and approving the budget and program for the coming year, we reviewed the League's activities during the past several months. We heard from Rep. Marlene O'Toole; the tri-county school superintendents, Cindy Kelley, city of Ocala; Marion County Com. Barbara Fitios and Scott Ales, former mayor of Eustis on the subject of growth management. In addition, we held a health care forum; at our December meeting, we reached concurrence on the question of transportation.

Looking forward to the coming League year's activities, we are preparing for the mock student election with the Sumter County school district. This project will be in conjunction with The Florida Joint Center for Citizenship, Department of Political Science, University of Central Florida. Once the August primaries are over, we will be conducting candidate and ballot issues forums. We have been approached by Lake Sumter Community College about the possibility of taping and televising the forums, and we are looking forward to that project. In August will be co hosting a Tea with AAUW in celebration of the 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment. So though small, we have many accomplishments with many more on the horizon.

Our guest speaker at our May General Meeting will be **T. J. Fish, Executive Director, Lake-Sumter MPO**. The article in last month's "Voter" outlined the duties and responsibilities of the MPO. Come and find out about what is on the agenda for Lake and Sumter Counties. As the first director of the Lake~Sumter MPO, his goal is to promote effective regional transportation partnerships. The best way to achieve this goal is by coordinating the wishes of

the various communities within the region into one comprehensive vision that is supported by citizen consensus. Transportation and road building is an important issue for the tri-county area not just Lake and Sumter Counties. Mark your calendars!



At their July board meeting, the state board will review all amendments on the November ballot and decide, based on League positions, whether to support, not support or take no position on the amendments.

## Amendments on the November Ballot

While most of our attention has been paid to Amendments 5 and 6, there are other amendments already on the ballot in November.

## **AMENDMENT 5**

### **STANDARDS FOR LEGISLATURE TO FOLLOW IN LEGISLATIVE REDISTRICTING**

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Legislative districts or districting plans may not be drawn to favor or disfavor an incumbent or political party. Districts shall not be drawn to deny racial or language minorities the equal opportunity to participate in the political process and elect representatives of their choice. Districts must be contiguous. Unless otherwise required, districts must be compact, as equal in population as feasible, and where feasible must make use of existing city, county and geographical boundaries.

#### **Full text:**

In establishing Legislative district boundaries:

(1) No apportionment plan or district shall be drawn with the intent to favor or disfavor a political party or an incumbent; and districts shall not be drawn with the intent or result of denying or abridging the equal opportunity of racial or language minorities to participate in the political process or to diminish their ability to elect representatives of their choice; and districts shall consist of contiguous territory.

(2) Unless compliance with the standards in this subsection conflicts with the standards in subsection (1) or with federal law, districts shall be as nearly equal in population as is practicable; districts shall be compact; and districts shall, where feasible, utilize existing political and geographical boundaries.

(3) The order in which the standards within sub-sections (1) and (2) of this section are set forth shall not be read to establish any priority of one standard over the other within that subsection.

## **AMENDMENT 6**

### **STANDARDS FOR LEGISLATURE TO FOLLOW IN CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING**

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Congressional districts or districting plans may not be drawn to favor or disfavor an incumbent or political party. Districts shall not be drawn to deny racial or language minorities the equal opportunity to participate in the political process and elect representatives of their choice. Districts must be contiguous. Unless otherwise required, districts must be compact, as equal in population as feasible, and where feasible must make use of existing city, county and geographical boundaries.

#### **Full text:**

In establishing Congressional district boundaries:

(1) No apportionment plan or individual district shall be drawn with the intent to favor or disfavor a political party or an incumbent; and districts shall not be drawn with the intent or result of denying or abridging the equal opportunity of racial or language minorities to participate in the political process or to diminish their ability to elect representatives of their choice; and districts shall consist of contiguous territory.

(2) Unless compliance with the standards in this subsection conflicts with the standards in subsection (1) or with federal law, districts shall be as nearly equal in population as is practicable; districts shall be compact; and districts shall, where feasible, utilize existing political and geographical boundaries.

(3) The order in which the standards within sub-sections (1) and (2) of this section are set forth shall not be read to establish any priority of one standard over the other within that subsection.
